Presidential Nomination for Chancellor Constance Carroll

President Barack Obama has nominated Dr. Constance M. Carroll to serve as a member of the National Humanities Council, which is related to the programs and grants of the National Endowment for the Humanities. Her final appointment is currently pending confirmation by the United States Senate.

Dr. Carroll is Chancellor of the San Diego Community College District. She also has academic preparation and a history of service in the humanities. Dr. Carroll earned a B.A. in Humanities from Duquesne University. She holds both an M.A. and Ph.D. in Classics (Ancient Greek and Latin) from the University of Pittsburgh. She also earned a Certificate in Hellenic Studies at Knubly University in Athens, Greece.

A founding member of the PRT, Constance Carroll has served as Chair of the California Council for the Humanities; served on the Maine Humanities Council; was a member of the National Endowment for the Humanities Panel on

Museums and Historical Societies; and is a longtime member of the national Community College Humanities Association Board of Directors. Dr. Carroll has made numerous presentations and has many publications to her credit in the humanities fields.

Stanback-Stroud Becomes President of Skyline College in California

Dr. Regina Stanback Stroud (Lakin Class 2003) was named ninth president of Skyline College, one of three colleges in the San Mateo Community College District, in November 2010 after a nationwide search. Prior to the appointment, Dr. Stanback-Stroud served as vice president of instruction. She assumed her duties as president on January 1, 2011.

Stanback Stroud has a strong and varied academic career in the community college system, including fifteen years teaching nursing and pharmacology, five years as Dean of Workforce and Economic Development at Mission College, and nine years as Vice President at Skyline College. While a faculty member at Rancho Santiago College (currently

Santa Ana College), Dr. Stanback Stroud was elected by her peers across the State to be the President of the Academic Senate for California Community Colleges.

Dr. Stanback Stroud holds a bachelor's degree in Nursing from Howard University; a master's degree in Human Relations from Golden Gate University and a master's degree in Educational Leadership from Mills College; and a Doctorate in Education, also from Mills College.



SCCC Receives \$11.2M Grant to Train Health Care Workers

Schenectady County Community College (SCCC) has received the largest single grant in the College's history, \$11.2 million, to train professionals for new jobs in the fast growing health care field.

SCCC was one of just four institutions in New York State and one of 32 in the nation to receive the job training funds. SCCC received


the largest grant award in New York State and the I Ith largest grant in the nation. The grant award is part of a \$320 million initiative under the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Affordable Care Act (ACA) to strengthen the health care workforce in the United States.

The grant funding will enable SCCC to offer a variety of training programs to help program participants get the training they need to enter the fast growing health care industry and then continue their education to achieve higher level positions.
