Mission Statement

The Presidents' Round Table is an affiliate organization of the National Council on Black American Affairs. The Council is designed to provide Black Community College Presidents an operational network including: 1) identifying and responding to issues affecting Blacks in community colleges; 2) providing mentoring opportunities for Blacks; 3) sharing professional resources; 4) providing other national and international professional opportunities for Black CEOs; and 5) supporting the goals and objectives of the National Council on Black American Affairs.

Role

In pursuit of this mission, the Presidents' Round Table will:

- monitor and review inequities in the delivery of educational services to Black students and services provided to Blacks in community colleges;
- promote the professional development and advancement of Black CEOs;
- provide formal and informal mentoring opportunities for Blacks within the CEO's institution;
- establish internships, when feasible, among member institutions, to provide opportunities for Blacks to have practical administrative experiences;
- share published and unpublished materials such as speeches, statistical data, research findings, and other items to assist members in their responsibilities;
- develop a third world/nation support package with emphasis toward current and emerging technologies for use by appropriate nations as requested;
- plan and hold two (2) meetings annually, one in conjunction with the AACC annual convention and the other at a time and place each year to be determined; and
- seek funding for special projects as agreed to by the Presidents' Round Table.

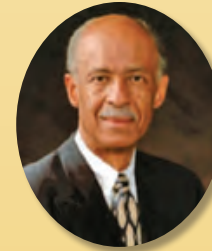

The Institution

Peralta Community College District, in its 46th year, is comprised of four colleges: Laney College and Merritt College in Oakland, College of Alameda in Alameda, and Berkeley City College in Berkeley. It serves the communities of Alameda, Albany, Berkeley, Emeryville, Oakland, and Piedmont; and provides over 30,000 students each semester with a wide range of educational programs that meet community needs. In addition to its transfer and basic skills programs, the Peralta Colleges have over 60 occupational education programs, strong fine arts and performing arts programs, a large ESL program, a full complement of athletics and cutting programs in green technologies and bio-science. The District is governed by a seven-member Board and has approximately 1,036 faculty members of which 307 are regular full-time and 729 hourly part-time. It is currently administered by 60 managers and 401 regular full-time support staff. The District has an operating budget of \$120 million.

The Institution

Dr. Ken Atwater became the seventh president of Hillsborough Community College (HCC) on July 1, 2010. As president of HCC, Dr. Atwater serves as the Chief Executive of the college, which was founded in 1968 as part of a 28-member community college system. HCC is currently the fifth largest community college district in the state of Florida, serving more than 45,000 students each year at its five campuses and three centers. HCC offers more than 150 academic programs, including 18 associate in arts tracks and over 140 workforce programs, and is responsible for training the majority of the community's first responders through its healthcare training and police and fire academies. HCC enrolls the largest number of graduates who go on to higher education from the School District of Hillsborough County, and is the largest community college feeder to the University of South Florida (USF) through the successful 2 + 2 program. Dr. Atwater's interest in light rail and his appointment come at an opportune time for the Tampa community. With its large student body and campuses throughout the county, efficient and affordable public transportation is a key issue that affects HCC, its faculty, staff, and students.

With a total annual budget of over \$215 million, HCC employs more than 2,400 and has a total economic impact of more than \$850 million. Over 75 percent of HCC graduates stay in the local community and; together, HCC and its former students contribute more than \$860 million in added income and economic impact to Hillsborough County.

The Institution

Southern University at Shreveport is a two-year comprehensive community college serving Shreveport, Bossier City, and surrounding areas in Northwest Louisiana. It is one of five campuses comprising the Historically Black Southern University System.

The Shreveport campus seeks to provide a quality education for its students, while being committed to the total community. The Institution

The Contra Costa Community College District (CCCCD) first opened its doors in 1949. It is the eighth largest community college district in California. The District serves a population of 1,019,640, and its boundaries encompass all but 48 of the 734 square mile land area of Contra Costa County.

The District is comprised of three colleges, (Contra Costa, Diablo Valley, and Los Medanos), the San Ramon Campus and Brentwood Center, and serves a diverse population of almost 65,000 students annually. Nearly 80% of District students work while attending college. The colleges are accredited by the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC), which is one of three commissions under the corporate entity known as the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).

More than 3,800 class sections are offered each semester, including a broad range of evening, weekend and online classes. Associate in arts and associate in science degrees are offered as well as numerous program certificates of achievement and completion. The District offers excellent transfer programs to prepare students for four-year colleges and universities. An ever-expanding International Education Program provides an exciting and enriching experience for students. The District is well respected and supported in the community, evidenced by the passage of two recent facilities bonds totaling over \$406 million.

The Institution

Tarrant County College (TCC) was established by a countywide election on July 31, 1965, as Tarrant County Junior College, the name change coming in 1999. The South Campus opened in 1967, followed by Northeast (1968), Northwest (1976), and Southeast (1996). The newest facility, the Trinity River Campus in downtown Fort Worth, opened in fall of 2009. Approximately one in every nineteen Tarrant County residents takes a class at TCC each year. The College District is governed by a seven-member Board of Trustees elected for staggered six-year terms in single member districts. The college is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Enrollment growth at TCC has been steady and sometimes spectacular. The South Campus, at 4,772, had the largest opening-day enrollment of any community college in the nation up to that time. Overall credit student enrollment passed the 20,000 mark in 1980 and exceeded 44,000 in the fall of 2009. More than 45,000 students are currently enrolled in TCC's associate degree and technical programs, making it the sixth largest among Texas colleges and universities.

TCC is committed to providing affordable and open access to quality teaching and learning. The college offers four types of degrees: Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, Associate of Arts in Teaching and the Associate of Applied Science. TCC also offers certificate programs and through its Continuing Education, Corporate and Workforce Services offers opportunities for businesses and individuals of all ages, through non-credit courses, workshops and customized training programs.

The Institution

The Dallas County Community College District (DCCCD) was created in 1965 as a unique learning-centered and community service institution – growing from its first college, El Centro College, that opened in 1966.

DCCCD now encompasses seven individually accredited colleges: Brookhaven, Cedar Valley, Eastfield, El Centro, Mountain View, North Lake and Richland, plus the LeCroy Center for Educational Telecommunications and Educational Technology. Our mission is to provide affordable and accommodating high-quality undergraduate credit and non-credit programs for students every semester, making it the largest higher education institution in the state of Texas. Since 1965, more than 1.5 million people have been served. Most recently Richland College was honored as the only community college to ever receive the prestigious Baldridge, Quality Award. DCCCD has a diverse student body, faculty, and staff and is nationally recognized for its Rising Star Scholarship Program and its Visiting Scholars, Minority Faculty Recruitment Program. The district employs three thousand persons and operates on a budget of approximately \$370,000,000.

The purpose of the District is to prepare students for successful living and responsible citizenship in a rapidly changing local, national, and world community. The District does this by providing accessible, accredited, affordable, cost-effective, quality learning opportunities for development of intellectual skills, job skills, personal growth, and/or transfer to a baccalaureate program. In fulfilling its purpose, the District furthers cultural, economic, and workforce development in the communities served. In all its efforts, the District serves to meet the needs and exceed the expectations of those the District serves.

The Institution

State Center Community College District (SCCCD) was formed in 1964 when it assumed control of Fresno City College and Reedley College. SCCCDD serves approximately one million people and 18 unified and high school districts in more than 5,500 square miles of urban and rural territory, including most of Fresno and Madera Counties and portions of Kings and Tulare Counties. SCCCDD is governed by a seven member Board of Trustees who are elected at-large and represent six trustee areas. Total district enrollment is approximately 34,000 students. SCCCDD is a merit system district with over 2,300 faculty and classified staff represented by the California School Employees Association (CSEA) and the American Federation of Teachers (AFT). The Institution

Founded in 1959, Broward College (BC) is the third largest community college in Florida's system of 28 community colleges. Approximately 66,000 students enroll annually in both credit and non-credit programs. The average age of a BC student is 24. Of all credit Full Time Equivalency (FTE) activity, 60% are in AA programs, 21% in AS programs, and 4% in A.A.S programs. Broward College recently earned SACS Level II status and

began offering Baccalaureate degrees in 2009 (hence, the name change from Broward Community College).

A total of 3,000 full- and part-time faculty and staff support the College's 155 degree and certificate programs. The student population of BC reflects the service area with 30% reported as African-American and 30% Hispanic. Broward College ranks 4th in the number of associate degrees conferred, 1st in the number of associate degrees conferred in Nursing and fifth in the number of associate degrees conferred in health professions and related sciences. Broward College is ranked 3rd nationally in granting degrees to minority students.

The College District has three campuses: North Campus in Coconut Creek, Hugh Adams Central Campus in Davie, South Campus in Hollywood, and seven centers, located in Fort Lauderdale, Pines, Weston, and Coral Springs, and Miramar. Junior Achievement the world's largest Junior Achievement Enterprise and Finance Park facility is located on Broward's North Campus. It is the first public private venture of this type. Title V: Funding for Hispanic-Serving Institutions – With the award of four Title V grants totaling \$12.47 million, Broward College has been nationally recognized by the U.S. Department of Education as a Hispanic-Serving Institution.

Lumina Foundation for Education: Achieving the Dream – The privately funded Lumina Foundation has awarded Broward College a four-year, \$400,000 grant to improve student success. BC, one of 27 colleges nationwide to receive a grant from the Indianapolis-based foundation, is using the funds to tailor math, reading and English preparatory classes to meet the specialized needs of at-risk students.

The Institution

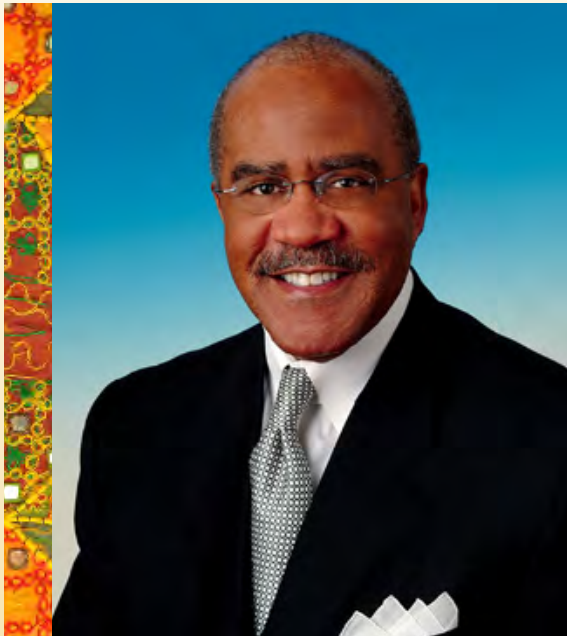

The Institution

Founded in 1920, the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC) has, over four decades, become the leading proponent and the national "voice for community colleges." The association was conceived when a group of presidents representing public and independent junior colleges met in St. Louis, Missouri, for a meeting called by the U.S. commissioner of education. Originally named the American Association of Junior Colleges (AAJC), the association was to function as a forum for the nation's two-year colleges.

In 1972, the name of the national organization was changed to the American Association of Community and Junior Colleges (AACJC), reflecting the community orientation of most public, two-year institutions. In 1992, the association's name was simplified to its present form.

Today, the association represents almost 1,200 two-year, associate degree-granting institutions and more than 11 million students, as well as a growing number of international members in Puerto Rico, Japan, Great Britain, Korea, and the United Arab Emirates. The colleges are the largest and fastest-growing sector of U.S. higher education, enrolling close to half (46 percent) of all U.S. undergraduates.

Headquartered in the National Center for Higher Education in Washington, D.C., AACC is the primary advocacy organization for community colleges at the national level and works closely with directors of state offices to inform and affect state policy. In addition, AACC is a member of "The Six" large, presidentially based associations and collaborates with a wide range of entities within the higher education community to monitor and influence federal policy and to collaborate on issues of common interest. The association has ongoing interaction with key federal departments and agencies including the U.S. departments of Labor, Education, Energy, Homeland Security, and Commerce and the National Science Foundation.

AACC supports and promotes its member colleges through policy initiatives, innovative programs, research and information and strategic outreach to business and industry and the national news media. Its efforts are focused in five strategic actions areas:

The Institution

The Compton Community College District (CCCD) serves the communities of Carson, Compton, Enterprise, North Long Beach, Lynwood, Paramount and Willowbrook. The District is governed by a state-appointed Special Trustee, who works with the five-member elected Board of Trustees. Board meetings are held the second Tuesday of each month and are open to the public. The District is located at 1111 East Artesia Boulevard, Compton, CA. 90221.

In 1927, the former Compton Community College was established as a component of the Compton Union High School District. In 1950, voters approved a bond measure separating the two, and the campus was constructed at the present site. After many successful years and following several challenging years, in June 2005, the Accrediting Commission for Community and Junior Colleges (ACCJC) announced its decision to revoke Compton College's accreditation. With this action, the ability to offer classes and grant degrees and transferrable units was terminated.

On June 30, 2006, Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger signed AB 318 (Dymally) into law, giving the Compton Community College District (CCCD) a \$30 million loan for recovery and the opportunity to partner with a college in good standing with the ACCJC to offer accredited courses.

On August 21, 2006, the El Camino Community College District (ECCCD) Board of Trustees approved a Memorandum of Understanding between the El Camino Community College District and the Compton Community College District.

The CCCD is governed by a Special Trustee appointed by the Chancellor of the California Community Colleges for matters related to personnel, policy, budget and finance, and facilities. The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) is primarily responsible for operations of the CCCD such as budget, fiscal policy, and the administration of labor agreements, legal matters, bond management, facilities management and human resources.

On December 1, 2010, California Community Colleges Chancellor Jack Scott appointed Dr. Genethia Hudley-Hayes as the Special Trustee for the Compton Community College District. On March 16, 2011, Dr. Hudley-Hayes appointed Dr. Keith Curry as Interim Chief Executive officer for the Compton District.

El Camino College Compton Center continues to provide accredited instructional and related support services to meet the needs of the CCCD area residents. Administration at El Camino College Compton Center is led by the Superintendent/President of El Camino College, Dr. Thomas Fallo.

Officially opening its doors to the community on September 11, 1967, Los Angeles Southwest College (LASC) was born out of the Watts Rebellion of 1965. In the 43 years since LASC opened its doors, it has established itself as an educational and cultural hub of south central Los Angeles and surrounding communities. Currently, enrollment exceeds 8,700 students enrolled in both credit and non-credit programs. 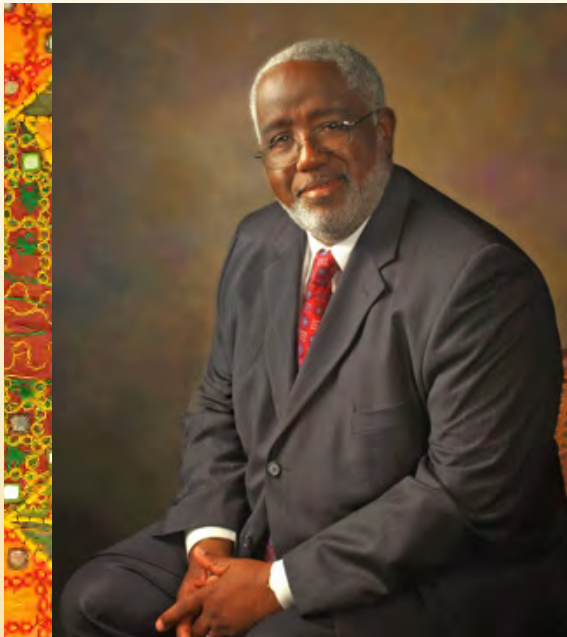

The Institution

The North Orange County Community College District is one of the largest in California, serving more than 76,000 students each term at its two comprehensive community colleges and School of Continuing Education. The District opened a major new higher education complex in the fall of 2002 in the city of Anaheim, incorporating both college and continuing education programs in one facility.

The service area of the District covers 155 square miles, 18 cities and communities and 16 school districts. The Institution

St. Louis Community College (STLCC) is the largest community college district in Missouri and one of the largest in the United States. The College is celebrating its 50th anniversary this year. Local voters approved by a two-to-one margin the formation of the Junior College District of St. Louis/St. Louis County in April 1962. It was the first district in the United States to simultaneously construct three campuses. The \$47.2 million bond issue approved in 1965 was the largest in the history of U.S. community college development at that time. The Institution

Olive-Harvey College began its service to residents of the South Side in the late 1950s with the opening of the Fenger and Southeast campuses of the City Colleges of Chicago. These two campuses were consolidated and renamed Olive-Harvey College in 1970. The college moved

to nine buildings located at its present site at Woodlawn Avenue and 101st Street pending the construction of a new building. The college is named in honor of two Chicagoans who lost their lives in Vietnam while on duty with the United States armed forces: Milton Lee Olive, III, paratrooper, and Carmel Bernon Harvey, Jr., infantryman. Both were posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.

The college is the largest campus (67 acres) of any of the City Colleges providing an atmosphere conducive to personal, social, and academic growth and success. The main facility, including outdoor physical education fields and landscaping, was built at a cost of approximately \$28.5 million. The building houses 35 special instructional areas and laboratories, 50 classrooms, a cafeteria, and Learning Resource Center, which houses the college's largest open computer laboratory. Physical education facilities include an indoor swimming pool and gymnasium, weight and exercise room, softball diamond, and a soccer field, all located on a landscaped campus. Other facilities include a Child Development Laboratory Center which provides day-care services for children of students and for the community.

The college has 30 computing centers, including a state-of-the-art academic computing center, and a MacLab. Nine one-story buildings on the campus provide space and facilities for other programs, including technical programs and short-term skills training.

The student body reflects diverse academic, cultural, and economic backgrounds. The college recognizes that education for this population of students has historically served as a means of improving their quality of life as well as providing access to participation in a larger society. Olive-Harvey College recognizes the aspirations and expectations of its students, the need for mastery of basic skills and knowledge, and the need for students to know themselves and the world in which they live. The college pledges itself and all of its resources to help students gain the knowledge, skills, and understanding requisite to effective participation and success in this rapidly changing and complex world.

Palm Beach Junior College became Florida's first public community college in 1933. In the beginning, it was a co-educational, day-student junior college with primary emphasis on preparation for upper-division work in colleges and universities. The Institution

Located on the western edge of the greater Kansas City metropolitan area, Kansas City Kansas Community College (KCKCC) is a public two-year institution serving more than 230,000 residents in Wyandotte and Leavenworth counties in northeast Kansas. “A Community of Colleges...Colleges for the Community.” With ten nationally accredited colleges, two skill centers and multiple satellite extensions, the Maricopa Community Colleges are a major resource for post-secondary education and job training in Arizona.

More than two million students have attended classes at the colleges since 1962 when voters elected to establish the Maricopa County Community College District. For more than half a century, the District has been an innovator in education, moving quickly to meet the ever changing needs of the communities it serves. Today, the Maricopa Community Colleges educate and train a diverse student body of more than 265,900 students annually. Some 231,856 students take credit courses, 22,502 are enrolled in non-credit special interest courses, 9,113 students in ABE/GED courses and 2,471 students are enrolled in the Skill Centers.

The Maricopa Community Colleges rank among the nation's largest community college systems. It is the largest single provider of higher education in Arizona, training the majority of the state's healthcare workers.

The colleges offer customized workforce training for business and industry in the Valley of the Sun. For over two decades, thousands of workers from local companies have received training through partnerships with the Maricopa Community Colleges and the District's Center for Workforce Development. Additionally, the District is moving forward with emerging programs in biotechnology and partnerships with such organizations as the Translational Genomics Research Institute in Phoenix. The District also is a leader in higher education technology. Each campus is equipped with state of the art computer labs and telecommunications.

In 2010, the Maricopa Community Colleges employed more than 1,350 full-time faculty and 4,900 adjunct faculty who are specialists in their fields. As of fall 2010, the District offered more than 9,200 courses and more than 1,037 academic degrees and occupational certificate programs.

Nine transfer-oriented associate degrees are offered, as well as 30 academic certificates. Each year, approximately 8,000 associate degrees and 10,000 certificates are awarded.

The Institution

West Virginia University (WVU) at Parkersburg was founded in 1961 as the Parkersburg Branch of West Virginia University. On July 1, 1971, it became Parkersburg Community College, one of the state's first comprehensive community colleges. In a reorganization of West Virginia's public higher education system in 1989, the institution became West Virginia University at Parkersburg, a regional campus of WVU. In 2008 the West Virginia Legislature changed WVU Parkersburg's governance structure and relationship to WVU in creating a state network of community and technical colleges.

Approximately 4,300 students attend WVU Parkersburg which is an affiliated institution with *West Virginia University* (the main campus in Parkersburg and the Jackson County Center in Ripley). WVU Parkersburg is one of 34 public institutions in the United States classified as a Baccalaureate/Associate's College by the *Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching*. The Parkersburg campus is the only public community college in West Virginia accredited to offer baccalaureate degrees. The college is located on the outskirts of Parkersburg and is easily accessible from I-77. It is a commuter campus and has no residential housing. WVU Parkersburg is accredited by *The Higher Learning Commission* and a member of the North Central Association.

WVU Parkersburg's programs include certificates, associate and selected baccalaureate degree programs. The institution's primary service area consists of seven counties in west-central West Virginia: Jackson, Pleasants, Ritchie, Roane, Tyler, Wirt, and Wood.

Today, the campus resides on 12.3 acres within the historical area of Roxbury and its facilities house specialized academic laboratories, state-of-the-art distance learning infrastructure, the Learning Resource Center, writing and language labs and is home to the world renowned Reggie Lewis Track and Athletic Center, where track and field competitions are held with athletes from all over the globe.

The Institution

Bermuda College was created by the Parliament of Bermuda through the passage of the Bermuda College Act in 1974. Under this Act, a Board of twelve Governors has the responsibility for the direction and management of the College. This provision for the governance of Bermuda's only post-secondary educational institution was patterned after similar governing Acts of state-funded universities in the USA and Canada. This helps to isolate the academic activities of the College from the political process, and enables the College to accept cultural and leadership roles in the community, which would be denied if it were an arm of Government.

In March 2010, Bermuda College received initial accreditation by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, becoming only the seventh international institution and the first in the Caribbean and Latin American regions to do so. Bermuda College has three academic divisions: the Division of Applied Science & Technology; the Division of Business

Administration & Hospitality; and the Division of Liberal Arts offering more than 40 associate degree, certificate and diploma programs. It also offers the Division of Professional and Career Education (PACE) for workplace development. Each year the College provides approximately 1400 students options and opportunities in higher education. The College for Working Adults is specifically tailored to allow working adults to complete an associate degree in business administration, in about the same time as a matriculating full-time student. Bermuda College also offers certified distance education courses, and boasts its own exhibition art gallery. Sample programme offerings include actuarial science, web development, accounting assistants, culinary arts, nursing assistants, education, art and design, wood technology, automotive technology, welding and plumbing technology. It has more than 20 active articulation agreements with four-year universities in Canada, the United Kingdom, the United States, and in the West Indies. Bermuda College is committed to setting Bermuda's students on the path to success. It welcomes everyone who has ever held the dream of higher education...and the desire to learn. It is a community college dedicated to offering the highest standards of academic and professional excellence, based not so much on one's background coming in... but on what one has been able to accomplish upon graduation.

The Institution

Halifax Community College is a public, two-year, educational institution with an open door admissions policy. The mission of the college is to improve the quality of life and the educational and economic base of the service area, which covers Halifax County (74% student population) and Northampton County (19% student population). Our headcount for the fall 2009 and

spring 2010 semesters grew by 25% each semester. We served 1,703 curriculum students in fall 2009 and 1,730 students in the spring semester 2010. Our spring 2010 enrollment represented the largest spring enrollment in HCC's history. The fall 2010 enrollment represented the largest enrollment in the history of HCC. HCC also prepares adults for the workforce through certificate, diploma, and associate degree programs as well as lifelong learning opportunities through Continuing Education. During the 2009-10 academic year, 12,499 students registered for continuing education and workforce related training. There were also 2,057 unduplicated curriculum students. Students enrolled in college transfer programs make up 32% of the population and students enrolled in AAS, Certificate, and Diploma programs total 68%.

Among the programs offered, the college's stellar Dental Hygiene Program received a \$119,650 five-year grant by the Kate B. Reynolds Charitable Trust to establish the HCC Healthy Smiles Dental Care Program in 2007. The program serves children in the area's elementary schools who otherwise would not receive dental care. HCC was also awarded a \$1.2 million dollar grant from the US Department of Education to serve disadvantaged minority males, provide mentoring activities and hire learning coaches to engage the male students involved in the P.R.I.D.E. program (**P**reparing Men for **I**ntellectual, **A**cademic and **E**ducational Success). HCC also opened the Roanoke Valley Early College (RVEC) fall 2009. The Roanoke Valley Early College experience is an exciting new educational opportunity for students, parents, staff, and our community. Students take middle school, high school and college courses throughout their five- to six-year academic plan of study. During its inaugural year, it served 63 students.

Our mission is to be a catalyst for educational, cultural, and economic development in the Roanoke Valley of eastern North Carolina by anticipating and responding to community needs.

The Institution

Community college education has existed in Chicago since 1911 when Crane Technical High School opened its doors to 28 adults seeking higher education. This led to the establishment of Crane Junior College. From this modest beginning, the City Colleges of Chicago (CCC) has grown to a family of seven diversified colleges, three learning centers, and four technical institutes.

Clarence Darrow, the renowned Chicago lawyer, argued in defense of the City Colleges when, during the Depression, its existence was threatened by a financially strapped Board of Education. Darrow stated that higher education in the form of the then "junior college," had to endure, because the City Colleges were "for the people." This philosophy has endured. The City Colleges today reaches over 200,000 people annually, through programs housed in local community-based organizations, public and

parochial high schools, social and service centers, branches of the Chicago Public Library, and 13 existing facilities of the City Colleges System.

As a result of state legislative action in 1966, the City Colleges status as a junior college changed to that of a comprehensive community college. Founded in 1933 with 41 students in a building adjacent to Palm Beach High School, Palm Beach State College has grown to four locations and over 49,000 students. 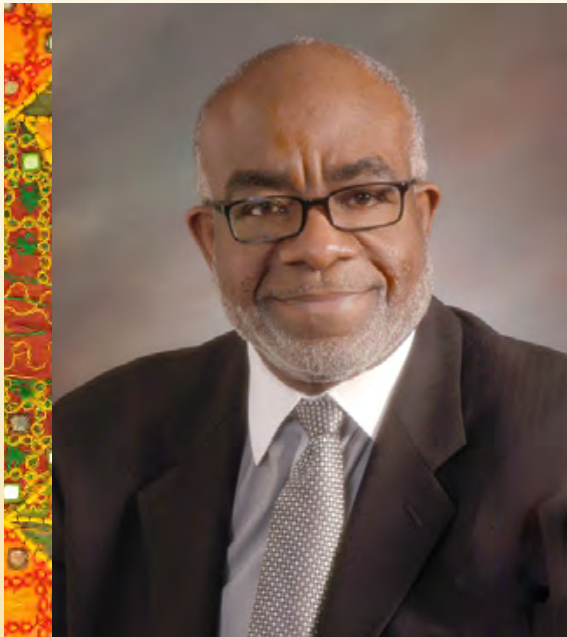

The Institution

Founded in 1970, College of Alameda (COA) is California's only community college located on an island. Situated on a beautiful park-like campus of 57.4 acres, it offers the quiet of a suburban setting yet within minutes there is access to the urban environments of San Francisco, Oakland and Berkeley. The main campus is located just south of Jack London Square with a satellite campus located on the North Field of the Oakland International Airport. The satellite campus houses the Aviation Maintenance Training Facility which includes two permanent buildings on 2.5 acres of land. COA also has one of the first early college high schools in California, the Alameda Science & Technology Institute (ASTI).

Solano Community College was founded in 1945 as Vallejo Junior College. The college district has sites in Fairfield, Vallejo, Vacaville, and Travis Air Force Base. 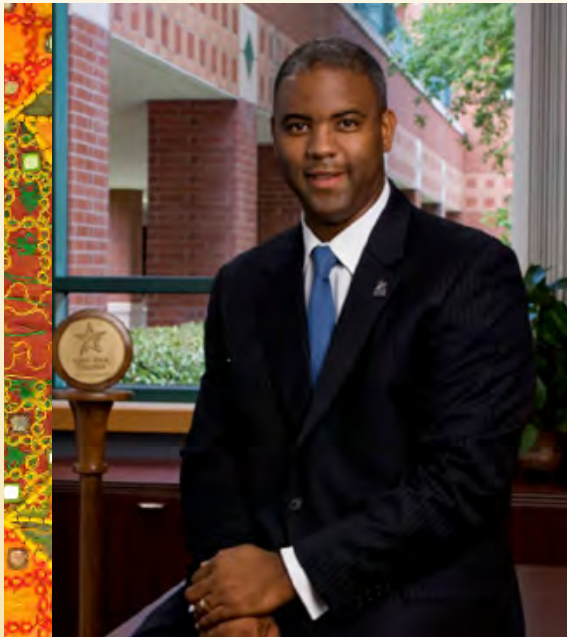

The Institution

Opened in 1995, Lone Star College-Montgomery is a 365,000-square-foot comprehensive college located on 165 acres of pine forest between The Woodlands and Conroe, TX. Part of the fast-growing Lone Star College System, LSC-Montgomery enrolled more than 12,500 credit students for the Fall 2010 semester. Additionally, more than 4,000 students take continuing education courses annually.

The Institution

Reid State Technical College was created by the Alabama State Legislature through a State statute on May 3, 1963. Through this enabling legislation, the College was chartered to provide citizens of the area greater and equal access to postsecondary education to help provide a trained workforce for area employers to assist in the economic development of the area. With the main campus located in Evergreen, the College now serves approximately 1000 students each semester. In 1981 Reid State Technical College established an off-site location in the city of Atmore, Alabama for the College's Practical Nursing Program. The Wiley Salter Auditorium and Administration Building was completed in 1986, and in 1990, major renovations were initiated for the creation of a learning center and high tech training laboratories for specialized training in computer software applications, programmable logic controllers, and instrumentation systems. A Workforce Development Center was opened in 2004 as a partnership between Reid State Technical College and the Conecuh County Board of Education to offer career technical classes/dual enrollment. The campus expanded in 2005 with the addition of the Stanley Busby CDL Classroom and Technology Center, a state-of-the art truck driving facility, where students are prepared for entry-level employment, upon licensure, as Class "A" commercial truck drivers. The Edith A. Gray Library and Technology Center was dedicated in December 2005. In 2009, the Atmore Nursing Program was relocated to the campus of Jefferson Davis Community College in Atmore, where it serves as a RSTC satellite site. The mission and purpose of Reid State Technical College is to provide post-secondary occupational education on a nondiscriminatory basis for individuals who desire to prepare for entry-level employment, advancement, or retraining in a career field. The training should meet the needs and standards of business, industry, and the professions, and also afford reasonable expectation of gainful employment. Major programs of study exist in Building Construction Technology, Child Care and Development, Collision Repair Technology, Commercial Truck Driving, Computer Information Systems, Cosmetology, Cosmetology Instructor Training, Industrial Electricity/Electronics Technology, Microcomputer Specialist, Nail Technology, Computer Networking Specialist, Nursing Assistant/Home Health Aide, Office Systems Technology, Practical Nursing, and Welding Technology. St. Philip's College was founded in 1898 by Bishop James Steptoe Johnston, son of a slave owner, through St. Philip's Episcopal Church of the West Texas Diocese. The school, which opened on March 1, 1898, began as a sewing class for black girls with fewer than 20 students in a house located in the area known today as the historic La Villita area in downtown San Antonio. Artemisia Bowden, a teacher and daughter of a former slave, later assumed leadership of the school. Under the direction of Miss Bowden over the ensuing 52 years, St. Philip's underwent monumental transformation, evolving from a parochial day school to an industrial school to a fully accredited two-year college offering a diverse curriculum with more than 120 degrees and certificates.

Today, St. Philip's continues to be a comprehensive, public community college whose mission is to provide a quality educational environment that stimulates leadership, personal growth and a lifelong appreciation for learning. The College strives to be an important force in the community, responsive to the needs of a population rich in its ethnic, cultural, and socio-economic diversity. Broward College (BC), previously known as
"Broward Community College," is a multi-campus,

The Institution

Created by the Postsecondary Education Improvement Act of 1997, the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS) is the largest provider of workforce training and postsecondary education in the state. The Institution

Providing service to the Lakeshore Region of West Michigan, Muskegon Community College (MCC) is located near the shores of Muskegon Lake and Lake Michigan. 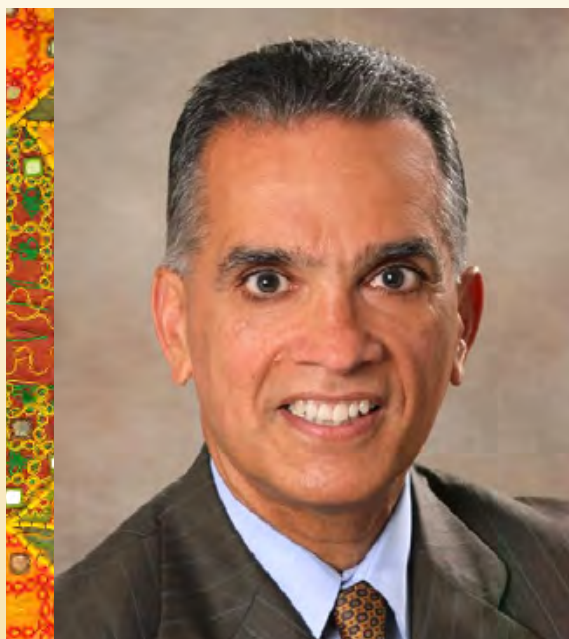

The Institution

One of only two Georgia institutions listed among the top 50 community colleges in the nation by *Washington Monthly* magazine, Atlanta Technical College is a postsecondary institution under the governance of the Technical College System of Georgia (TCSG). As one of 26 technical colleges in the state, Atlanta Technical College adheres to the policies and requirements set forth by the TCSG. Atlanta Technical College prepares students for the world of work.

Atlanta Technical College occupies a 48-acre campus on Metropolitan Parkway southwest of downtown. Quality technical education requires laboratory facilities comparable to workplaces in business and industry, and with an annual budget of more than \$23 million, the college maintains an academic environment current with state-of-the-art technology. Budget expenditures have been generously supplemented with donations of equipment and technical

advice from corporations committed to technical education. These business partnerships foster a new level of cooperation to enhance technical education.

Tracing its origin through six decades, Atlanta Technical College has grown from fairly modest beginnings. Atlanta Technical College was established as Smith-Hughes Vocational School at 232 Pryor Street, and first enrolled adults in vocational education in 1945 following World War II. The school was moved in 1964 to Smith High School at 535 Hill Street and renamed Hoke Smith Technical Institute. At that time, about 24 occupational programs were offered. Federal funding for vocational education in the late 1960s promoted the concept of area vocational technical schools.

In 1967, the school was reorganized as Atlanta Area Technical School and was moved to its current southwest campus, enrolling its first students in the new facilities in January 1968. In 1973, the Northside extension campus, Tuxedo Center, was opened at 4191 Northside Drive in northwest Atlanta. The Child Care Center and Ferguson Hall Annex were completed the same year. In 1997, the school's name was changed to Atlanta Technical Institute and the institution became part of the Georgia Department of Technical and Adult Education. Dr. Brenda Watts Jones was tapped to become president, making her the first African-American woman in Georgia to lead a technical institution. The tradition of exceptional history lives on with, Dr. Alvetta Peterman Thomas, who was named the college's sixth president in March 2008.

In June 1999, Atlanta Technical Institute completed a \$1.3 million renovation of its south entrance façade. The renovation provided covered walks and outdoor seating plazas. On July 1, 2000, the name was changed to Atlanta Technical College. New facilities include the Cleveland L. Dennard Conference Center and Administration Building (2004) and the Brenda Watts Jones Allied Health and Technology Complex (2010). With an average quarterly enrollment of 4,800 students, Atlanta Tech offers associate degrees, diploma programs, technical certificates of credit, and continuing education short-term courses. In addition to day and evening class schedules, Atlanta Technical College, through its Economic Development Division, produces customized training courses for business and industry.

Atlanta Technical College has produced six state winners of the Georgia Occupational Award of Leadership (GOAL), which is the highest award given to outstanding technical students in Georgia. In addition to having an excellent track record in producing winners in state competitions, students who attend Atlanta Technical College also excel in regional and national competitions representing associations and organizations.

Atlanta Technical College provides an exceptional education to a diverse group of students, representing ethnic groups from around the world, younger and older people, high school and college graduates, persons with special needs, and persons with varied backgrounds, educational requirements, and interests. Women are enrolled in nontraditional occupational training programs such as Automotive Technology, Carpentry, and Welding and Joining Technology. Day, evening, online, and hybrid classes are available.

The Institution

Elizabethtown Community and Technical College (ECTC) is one of 16 colleges in the Kentucky Community and Technical College System (KCTCS). It is the result of the consolidation of Elizabethtown Community College and Elizabethtown Technical College. The doors of the college opened in 1964. The Institution

For more than 60 years, Odessa College (OC) has offered a varied and extensive number of educational programs designed to meet the needs and dreams of its students. Beginning with 184 students in 1946, OC has grown steadily through the years and now has about 5,000 students enrolled in university-parallel and occupational/technical credit courses. During a year, almost 11,000 individuals also enroll in one or more Adult Basic Education, Continuing Education or Community Recreation courses.

Many university-parallel courses are offered for students planning to complete four-year degrees at senior colleges or universities and are freely transferable. Former OC students have a phenomenal record of success in the fields of accounting, law, medicine, music, public administration and teaching.

More than 30 occupational/technical programs also are offered, and additional ones are planned to meet the needs of citizens who want to learn new or improve existing skills. With more than 30 percent of our students enrolled in occupational/technical programs, OC continues to fulfill the workforce training demands of our community.

Initially housed in temporary quarters in the old Odessa High School, OC's first classes were conducted after public school hours in late afternoons and evenings. Ector County taxpayers purchased a five-acre plot in the 2500 block of the Andrews Highway and in 1949 authorized the building of Baskin Hall, the first permanent structure. The campus grew to 15 buildings on a 35-acre plot by 1960. Then during the 1990's, OC received three major property donations as the college continued to expand to serve the educational needs of its students and service area. Among the property donations to OC in late 1997 was one of the largest and best-equipped equine facilities in the nation. Located in nearby Gardendale, Texas, the 120-acre ranch, now called the Odessa College Rodeo and Agriculture Graham Center, was donated for the enhancement of the Odessa College Rodeo Team and the development of programs for students majoring in agriculture. Today, the \$55 million main campus in Odessa spreads over more than 80 acres and includes some 28 buildings that house more than 150 classrooms, laboratories and other facilities.

OC boasts a \$7 million Sports Center with more than 110,000 square feet of floor space that houses athletics, physical education and community recreation activities. The college also is home to public radio station KOCV-FM.

Odessa College has not only expanded its facilities, but has also expanded its educational services to much of West Texas. The OC service area now covers more than 33,000 square miles, making it the largest service area for any community college in Texas. OC offers extension courses and/or Adult Basic Education courses in five towns as well as offering "CollegeNOW" dual credit classes in 19 area high schools. Additionally, it offers courses throughout the state of Texas, the United States and the world via the Internet and OC Global.

As the college has grown, so has its effectiveness. Quality education and academic excellence have long been its hallmarks. As our community and service area needs change, Odessa College is dedicated to restructuring its programs to do more to serve its constituents.

Mentoring African-American Leaders for the Future

The Lakin Institute for Mentored Leadership is a national professional development activity sponsored by the Presidents' Round Table of African-American Community College CEOs. The Institute provides a personal and professional development experience for selected individuals who have demonstrated a potential for expanded leadership roles in their current, or future responsibilities within community colleges. Participants develop and strengthen leadership competencies through participation in the Institute. Named in honor of Dr. Thomas Lakin, a career educator and visionary from Los Angeles, California, the Lakin Institute is a legacy to the lifetime and vision he brought to community college leadership. The Lakin Institute for Mentored Leadership fulfills the vision of a man who was dedicated to excellence in educational leadership, and draws inspiration from the achievements and life of Thomas Lakin. The Institute has been offered annually since 1994.

The Institute is designed to prepare senior-level executives for positions as community college chief executive officers and has graduated the highest number of African Americans who have gone on to CEO positions over any other leadership institute in the United States. Over twenty-five per cent of current African-American community college presidents are alumni of the Lakin Institute.

The distinguished faculty of the Lakin Institute includes current community college CEOs, current and past members of the American Association of Community Colleges Board of Directors, and trustees and staff of the Association of Community College Trustees. The Lakin faculty mentors and shares their expertise, challenging participants to realize their potential.

The Institute includes both formal and informal opportunities to experience collegial and open dialogues. Areas of focus include: preparation for the hiring processes (including mock interviews), strategic planning, financial development, board relations, creating a vision, consensus-building, negotiating, and others. The Institute offers a unique opportunity to network and develop bonds within the group. Participants learn first hand the fine techniques of leadership from those who have been successful and who are eager to share their experiences and the lessons learned.

Selection to the Lakin Institute is competitive. Participants should currently report to the most senior officer of the organization and be poised to assume the role of CEO or equivalent as their next position. Experience is not limited to community college experience but might also include university, business, government, or other organizational experience.

Mentoring African-American Leaders for the Future

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DR. THOMAS LAKIN

Dr. Lakin was a student in the Los Angeles public school system, graduating from Dorsey High School in the early 1960s. He continued his education at UCLA where he received his undergraduate degrees and doctorate in higher education administration. He served as a counselor in the Los Angeles community college system as well as vice president for instruction at Los Angeles Trade Technical College, a school that, through his diligence and leadership, became a jewel in the middle of south central Los Angeles. In 1986, Dr. Lakin was appointed president of Los Angeles Southwest College and later Chancellor of the Ventura Community College district. He passed away after a short illness in 1994.

Dr. Lakin is quoted as having said, "I was profoundly driven as a young adult, as a young parent and as a young black person to forever seek out people of goodwill, and to persistently seek social justice. To this end, I have committed my life." Thomas Lakin believed there was no limit to what was possible for an African-American leader in higher education. He had the great gift of recognizing talent, knew how to bring out the potential of subordinates and colleagues, and went the extra mile to help people with their career aspirations. He hired ten people from diverse backgrounds with different skills in his first college cabinet. Within five years, every one of those ten, who so desired, had been promoted.

He knew how to have a good time and enjoyed life. He was a marathon runner who participated in nine Los Angeles marathons. He was an avid gardener and loved his roses. He was generous and would spend a thousand dollars on a meal for his administrative staff as a reward for hard work. He had an unquenchable desire and stamina for hard work. He is known to have said to a colleague who lamented the possibility of becoming forty years old before finishing his doctorate, "How old will you be if you don't get the degree?" He could cut through to the heart of an issue, making it clear, seeing the solutions, and never doubting the attainability of the goals.
