And, I am particularly mindful of the recent observance of the 50th anniversary of the passage of the landmark Civil Rights Act. The legislation formally states:

An Act

To enforce the constitutional right to vote, to confer jurisdiction upon the district courts of the United States to provide injunctive relief against discrimination in public accommodations, to authorize the Attorney General to institute suits to protect constitutional rights in public facilities and public education, to extend the Commission on Civil Rights, to prevent discrimination in federally assisted programs, to establish a Commission on Equal Employment Opportunity, and for other purposes.

Consistent with the practices in the South, Jim Crow laws were rampant. In the North and West, James Crow, Jim's less lethal cousin, was denying the same rights to people of color. I raise this issue because the same efforts used to procure civil rights must be maintained to ensure that all Americans have the unalienable rights and opportunities to live the "American dream."

We enlist your ongoing support to make certain that, at the very least, we remain armor bearers for the rights to equal public education, and access through success. Thomas L. Lakin Institute for Mentored Leadership

Named in honor of Dr. Thomas Lakin, a career educator and visionary from Los Angeles, California, the Lakin Institute is a legacy to the lifetime and vision he brought to community college leadership The Lakin Institute for Mentored Leadership fulfills the vision of a man who was dedicated to excellence in educational leadership, and draws inspiration from the achievements and life of Thomas Lakin.

TARGETED AUDIENCE

The Institute is designed to prepare senior-level executives for positions as community college chief executive officers and has graduated the highest number of African Americans who have gone on to CEO positions over any other leadership institute in the United States. Over twenty-five percent of current African American community college presidents are alumni of the Lakin Institute.

2015 ASPEN Award

S everal institutions headed by PRT members are among the 150 nationwide under consideration for the 2015 ASPEN Award, an award given by the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC).

- The award is given to colleges that have done an excellent job with completion, labor-market, learning, and equitable outcomes.
- The winner of the award will receive \$1 million.
- In the first round, 150 community colleges were selected for consideration from 1,005 potential candidates based on IPEDs data.
- The second round for the award requires the submission of an application.
- Ten finalists will be broadly publicized in fall 2014.
- The first award was given to Valencia, College (FL.) in 2011, and the 2013 co-winners of the award were Santa Barbara City College (CA) and Walla Walla Community College (WA).

Griffin Nominee for AACC 2014 Awards of Excellence

Dr. Ervin Griffin, Sr., president of Halifax Community College, was one of four finalists in the category of exemplary CEO/board for the American Association of Community Colleges' (AACC) 2014 Awards of Excellence.

Halifax Community College (HCC) serves two of the most destitute counties in North Carolina. Despite this, in 2013 HCC was ranked 12th among the 50 best community colleges in the nation by Washington Monthly. This is a result of the college's leadership. In 2006, the HCC board of trustees selected Dr. Ervin Griffin, Sr., as the college's president. Only a few months later, Dr. Griffin began a high-visibility campaign to highlight the campus and its services. The following year, HCC's information technology infrastructure was upgraded, allowing the entire campus access to wireless Internet. Aggressive enrollment management, resource development and institutional effectiveness and planning programs also were implemented, leading to significant increases in enrollment.

A key initiative of Dr. Griffin's is improving success for black males. He secured a \$1.2 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education for a program to help black males enroll, graduate and transfer to four-year institutions. In 2009, the Community College Survey of Student Engagement named the male-mentoring project one of the top programs in the nation for cultivating connections with male students.

Dr. Charlene Dukes Recipient of ACE Diversity Award

t its 96th annual meeting, the American Council on Education (ACE) honored Prince George's Community College President Charlene M. Dukes with the 2014 Reginald Wilson Diversity in Leadership Award. Dr. Dukes is recognized as an unwavering force in promoting diversity in higher education and for her resolve to ensure all students have access to the tools and resources needed to succeed academically and professionally.

The award is named in honor of Reginald Wilson, senior scholar emeritus at ACE and former director of the Council's Office of Minority Concerns and is given every year to an individual who has made outstanding contributions and demonstrated sustained commitment to diversity in higher education.
